Questions for reflection and discussion:

- 1. The author writes, "It is not death that the very old tell me they fear. It is what happens short of death..." (p. 55)
 - a. What do you fear most about the end of life?
 - b. How do you think your family would react if you told them, "I'm ready"?
 - c. How do we strike a balance between fear and hope, while still confronting reality?
- 2. Chapter 4 describes the birth of the assisted-living facility concept (Park Place), designed by Keren Wilson to provide her disabled mother, Jessie, with caregivers who would not restrict her freedom. Key components included having her own thermostat, her own schedule, her own furniture and a lock on the door. What other components would you add.
- 3. What are some of the realities captured in the story of Lou Sanders and his daughter, Shelley, regarding home care for an aging and increasingly frail parent? What conflicts did Shelley face between her intentions and the practical needs of the family and herself? (p. 103-109)
- 4. A key concept this week is "home" as much more than just the place where you go to bed at night. Home evokes a set of values and freedoms for many as they face old age. As you consider the life you want to lead in old age, what does "home" mean to you?
